- <u>The Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Butterflies</u> by Robert Pyle. Lots of photographs so more examples and covers the whole country
- <u>Butterflies of the East Coast: An Observer's guide</u> by Rich Cech and Guy Tudor. This is a coffee table book, not a field guide. Has much more life history information than the field guides.
- <u>Caterpillars of Eastern North America</u> by David Wagner. Princeton, Princeton University Press, 2005. The book on caterpillars!
- <u>Caterpillars in the Field and Garden</u> by Allen, Brock and Glassberg. Oxford, Oxford University Press. 2005
- <u>The Family Butterfly Book</u> by Rick Mikula. Not only has great descriptive identification of the common species, but also projects and activities
